# ETFO HUMANITY FUND

# The ETFO Humanity Fund supports children and their teachers around the world, enriching their lives and the lives of their communities.

# How does it work?

For most of its history, the ETFO Humanity Fund has been financed through the payroll deductions of members in locals who have chosen to participate. Members from these participating locals have a dime-a-day (\$20 per year) deducted from their salary through an arrangement made with the employer that allows automatic payroll deductions. These funds are then forwarded to the ETFO Humanity Fund by the members' school boards. In addition, a resolution passed by delegates at the 2011 Annual Meeting determined that every active member of ETFO contributes 0.0046% of their gross annual salary to the ETFO Humanity Fund.

The ETFO Humanity Fund is run by a board made up of members of the provincial Executive, leaders from participating locals and two rank-and-file members of ETFO. Applications for funding are considered for acceptance twice a year, once in the fall and once in the spring. The application is online at <u>etfohumanityfund.ca</u>. Any registered Canadian charity is welcome to apply to fund projects in Ontario and around the world.

The ETFO Humanity Fund signature charity is the Stephen Lewis Foundation, <u>stephenlewisfoundation.org</u>. Its mandate is to provide care for women suffering from HIV/AIDS, to assist orphans and other children affected by AIDS, to support grandmothers caring for orphaned grandchildren and to support groups of people living with HIV/AIDS.
